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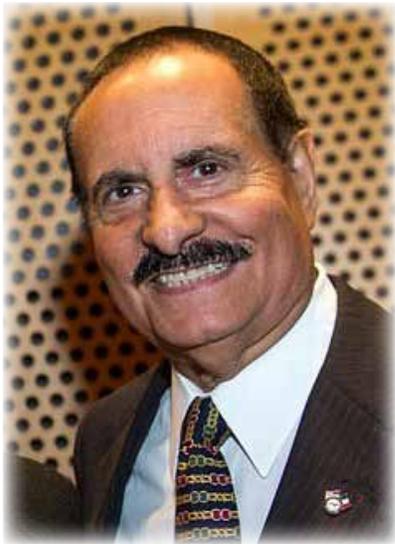
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JANE's October was packed with fabulous events.



November Meeting Thanksgiving Dinner at Longfellow's Wayside Inn Sudbury, Massachusetts - Wednesday, November 15

Don't miss JANE's traditional Thanksgiving dinner. And what better place to have it than at the historic 1700s Longfellow's Wayside Inn with your Jaguar friends.

Henry Wadsworth Longfellow visited the Inn in 1862, though by that time it had closed following the 1861 death of its proprietor, James Lyman Fields. It remained closed until 1897. Earlier, in 1861, Longfellow had embarked on a book of poems depicting a group of fictitious characters frequenting the Inn. The poems were published in late 1863 as the *Tales of a Wayside Inn*. The work included the well-known *Paul Revere's Ride*, which had been published earlier (*Atlantic Magazine*, 1861), though retitled as *The Landlord's Tale*. Longfellow's book brought the Inn to a level of national significance.



Our speaker for the evening will be the Innkeeper, Steve Pickford, who will speak on the fascinating history of the Inn.



JANE Fast Fall Slalom

The last JANE Slalom event of the year was held on October 14 and was one of the best we've had in ages. The day started out cool, cloudy, and damp, but by the time drivers were ready for action, the sun had come out, the track was dry, and the racing began.

We had 25 cars and drivers, with 12 from JANE and 13 from other car clubs or simply interested drivers, both near record numbers for a JANE Slalom event. We also had a great selection of cars, new and old, lots of Jaguars, classic sports cars, race cars, and an 82-year-old English sports car. The various clubs that participated included the Gate City Corvette Club, British Cars of New Hampshire (who have been frequent participants in our past slaloms), and the New England Region chapter of the Porsche Club of America. We were also visited by our old friends from the Jaguar Club of Southern New England, Dean Cusano with his fabulous full-race XJS and Ken Haas with a D Production MGB race car.

We got started driving about 11am, and due to the number of cars, we went straight through until everyone had completed their five timed runs. And yes, 5x25x3 does total to 375 separate laps of the course. When you consider starting, running, and officiating, it added up to over four hours of continuous action. Special thanks go out to the timer, Glen the starter, and to the various folks who helped run the stop-box, sprinted out to set up cones when they got knocked over, and otherwise kept the action moving. We all had a pretty exciting day for sure.

We had great competition on the course, with three different cars challenging each other all day long. We had JCSNE member Dean Cusano with his evil grey XJS, JANE member John Loring with his frighteningly black Dodge Viper, and newcomer Gary Harrington driving a Subaru BRZ, all pulling times under 41 seconds. And yes, a tiny two-door Subaru dicing it up with a V-10 Viper and Dean's monster XJS – amazing. In the end, Dean's XJS beat the BRZ by a mere 0.3 seconds to score fastest time of the day. But the BRZ similarly beat the Viper by a bare 0.21 seconds to claim faster street car. It was all very exciting and wasn't determined until the very last runs by each.

Not to be outdone, Gary Hagopian brought his beautiful red E-Type V12 and used it to convincingly beat every other Jaguar, including an F-TypeR and a brand-new F-Type. Congratulations, Gary, on being fastest street Jaguar!

Other Jaguars included Rob Gardner and his beautiful E-Type, but more about him later; Bonnie Getz with her sweet E-Type, more about her, too; Dave Moulton with his wonderful sounding F-TypeR; similarly with Paul Bettinger and his F-Type, Rich Canter and his XK, and John Frost with his AWD X-Type.

As for Rob and Bonnie, no Slalom event would be complete without mechanical “challenges,” and so it was that day. Rob was the first of the day to discover the pleasures of leaving a trail of the finest British car parts behind him when the “crankshaft damper assembly” decided to separate itself from the front of the motor, taking the water pump belt with it! He eventually had to travel back to New Hampshire and get his car trailer to come pick up the car.

Likewise, Bonnie found the delights of British electrical systems when the battery in her E-Type gave up the ghost and her car would not restart after making a run. Dean and Glen offered assistance, but it soon became clear that her battery had discharged its last volts. She eventually found a replacement in Salem, New Hampshire (late on a Saturday in October!), and a ride from Linda Kosinski to go get it, while Dave stayed behind at the track to protect the forlorn E-Type. But all

worked out, and Bonnie was able to replace the battery and get home before dark.

Victor Cromie also graced us with his 1935 Riley Imp. He was accompanied by his son-in-law, Steve Heaphy, driving Victor’s XK120. I mean, if you’re going to drive an 80-year-old English car over 60 highway miles and then race it, wouldn’t you certainly want to bring a 60-year-old English car with you, just in case something went wrong? Victor reports that he inherited the Riley from his father in 1952 and has had it since then. Over the years he removed the fenders and lights and raced it extensively in SCCA races well into the 1980s and until the engine dropped a piston, after which a full body-off restoration was done. Needless to say, it set the mark for the day!

JANE 2017 Lobster Tour

Twenty-seven JANE members and guests enjoyed a tour of the New Hampshire and southern Maine sea-coasts on October 7. In contrast to last year's rain during the event, the weather was perfect this year. Also of note, this year we had four dogs accompany their owners on the trip! We had a full sampling of Jaguars on the tour: E-Types, X-Types, Mk 2s, XJs, XF, and an F-Pace. Frank and Janet Bajowski graced us with their XE Jaguar, but unfortunately could not go on the tour with us. And of course, there were plenty of opportunities for photos.



The driving route started at our meeting point, the Portsmouth, New Hampshire, traffic circle liquor store, and a convenient location for all needs, including bathroom facilities and an easy-to-find parking lot for our Jags. This year's tour consisted of a 50-mile route of coastal and back roads.

The tour traversed along the northern New Hampshire Atlantic coast-line in Rye, passing Odiorne State Park, Wallis Sands State Beach, and stopping at Rye Harbor State Park overlooking Rye Harbor. Fortunately, we had the opportunity to see the harbor at high tide.

Like last year, the "Lobster Tour gods" were with us, since the harbor is much more scenic during high tide than at low. But this year we had the additional pleasure of seeing high waves and surfers. We also saw the John Smith Memorial, for the first European to map and name New England, in 1614, the same John Smith who founded Jamestown in 1607. For National Geographic Channel *Wicked Tuna* TV buffs, the ship *Pinwheel* is based in Rye Harbor.

We then followed the coastal route along the ocean past Jenness State Beach, where surfers are seen year round, beautiful homes, many built with fantastic views of the ocean and with classic designs from a century ago. We traveled as far south as North Hampton, at which point we lined up for individual photos with the Atlantic Ocean as the background. We passed by Fuller Gardens, a stop later in the tour for those who had time. After photos we wandered inland, passing Runnymede Farm, the home of Dancer's Image, winner of the 1968 Kentucky Derby. Our course traversed through the back roads of Rye, more horse farms, Norm Michaels' Brit Bits, and progressed toward New Castle.



Once in New Castle, we passed the Wentworth by the Sea, a classic Marriott

hotel built in 1874 and recently updated. Of course there is a classic marina and golf course on the grounds as well. This time of year there are often weddings on the front lawn. New Castle is an old fishermen's community with century-old homes lining the winding roads.



We wound our way into the oldest parts of Portsmouth for more fisherman homes and narrow streets, Prescott Park with an array of beautiful flowers still in bloom, and proceeded toward

the Memorial Bridge, which crosses the Piscataqua River. Then off to Maine through Kittery, by the Naval Shipyard, and nearby, Chauncey Creek Lobster Pier, a former JANE tour dinner destination. Member Spotlight

Margaret Caruolo – Native American Narragansett Indian, Jaguar Aficionado, Beloved Member of JANE

It all began with a vision -- Margaret Caruolo's path to the purchase of her first Jaguar and her subsequent membership in the Jaguar Association of New England (JANE). Spirits, signs, and visions are very much a part of the American Indian culture, and Margaret just happens to be a Narragansett Indian.

At some time around the beginning of the 2000's, Margaret had a very clear vision that she was test driving a car, with a female salesperson sitting next to her. The type of car was not specified in her vision, but as they drove along, there was a *rattle rattle rattle* from the trunk. Margaret looked at the saleslady and asked, "What's that?" The saleslady explained that the car was a salesperson's demo car and that there were lawn mower parts in the trunk to be taken to be fixed.

About six months after her vision, while working in her garden one afternoon, Margaret received a "message." It was not a vision, like before, but exact words that came to her, telling her to "go to Kaplan's Jaguar." Margaret was not thinking about cars at the time, nor anything other than her gardening. But she heeded the message, immediately got into her pickup, and drove to Kaplan's Jaguar, still wearing her gardening clothes. Kaplan's was not far from her home, in Rhode Island, though she had never been there.

She parked in front of the family-owned dealership, went inside, and looked at three or four Jaguars on the showroom floor. Although several employees peeked out from their sales offices, no salesperson approached her – perhaps her attire didn't bode a "quick sale." Finally, Elaine Kaplan came over to her, warm and friendly, and giving her a big smile. An S-Type on the showroom floor had caught Margaret's eye, and she explained, "I am interested in maybe buying a Jaguar." Elaine showed her a couple more models, but noted that "it's rush hour, with heavy traffic now," and suggested that she come back the next day and they could go for a test drive.

So Margaret went away, and did come back the following day. During her test drive, along with Elaine Kaplan, sure enough there was a *rattle rattle rattle* from the boot. When Margaret asked what the noise was, Elaine explained that the car was one of their salespersons' demo car, and it had lawn mower parts in the boot to be taken for repair. Said Margaret immediately, "I'm supposed to have this car, I'll take one of these." She wrote a check for a new, medium blue S-Type, named it Samantha, and drove it home, and the rest is history, as the saying goes.

Over the next few years Margaret added a black XJR100L. Later came another S-Type, red this time, which she eventually traded for a black XKR. Then there was a newer XKR in British Racing Green. After that came an XJRL Portfolio Edition, just before the design change of the XJ's. Margaret still has the Portfolio, but a little over a year ago she traded her last XKR for a red F-Type coupe. All of her Jaguars have



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come from the Kaplan Jaguar dealership, where they now treat her like family. Oh, she also has a Chevy Traverse, always having a “practical” car to use in case road conditions are not good or safe parking may not be available for her Jaguars wherever she is going.

But let’s go back to the time immediately after that first S-Type purchase. It occurred to Margaret that she might look into joining a Jaguar club, and she learned of JANE, which in those days held monthly meetings at Skip’s Diner in Chelmsford, Massachusetts. She was “scared to death” going to that first meeting. At the front of the diner a waitress pointed the way to the back room, where the club was meeting behind closed doors. She worked up her courage to open the door, then just stood there, and finally asked, “Is this the Jaguar club?” The entire group welcomed her to come in and sit down. She joined JANE in 2001, soon after her first club meeting, and thus began Margaret’s long association with JANE.



Margaret is a very gentle lady, a widow, has some health issues now, and moves gracefully with the assistance of a cane. She



rarely misses a meeting or an event and is now an emeritus board member of JANE. For years Margaret has sponsored the Champion Division and Driven Division Best in Show trophies awarded at JANE’s annual Concours. And although her voice is low and raspy from throat cancer, she always personally makes the presentations of these trophies to the winners at our Concours. And she always does so with a very moving and eloquent story about how very special it is to drive a Jaguar. Sometimes, following these Concours awards ceremonies Margaret takes to the dance floor and moves to the music, recalling her younger days as a “Fancy Dancer” at her Native American Indian pow-wows, always at her best, she says, when she had a good drummer!

Margaret is also known by the Native American names of Whippoorwill, Buffalo Rider (her warrior name), Jaguar of the Night, and Morning Eagle. She has been honored by the Massachusetts Center of Native American Awareness.

Considering her age and her gentle nature, one might think that none of Margaret’s Jaguars has ever been driven over 70 mph, but she insists she drives them up to 100 mph, and has even been stopped four times for speeding, talking herself out of tickets on two of those occasions.

Several JANE members and many of her Indian friends helped Margaret celebrate her 80th birthday in May of 2017.



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
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
